

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REDGRAVE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

Outline Plan/Roadmap

The Outline plan/roadmap for the Redgrave Neighbourhood Plan Update is as follows:

Step 1 – Initial Review (In-House)

Parish Council and Steering Group review the made Neighbourhood Plan to assess what remains effective, what is out of date, and what needs updating in light of national and local policy changes.

Step 2 – Agree Scope and Project Plan/Liaise with the Local Planning Authority (LPA) (In-House)

Define whether the update is a partial or full review, confirm objectives, prepare an indicative timetable, and agree governance, roles and responsibilities.

Step 3 – Update the Evidence Base

Refresh technical and background evidence (e.g. housing, environment, transport, heritage, business, infrastructure) to ensure policies are robust, proportionate and policy-compliant.

Step 4 – Early Engagement and Community Involvement

Engage with residents, businesses, landowners and key stakeholders to identify issues, priorities and options for the updated Plan.

Step 5 – Policy Review and Drafting

Review existing policies against updated evidence and policy context; amend, delete or draft new policies as necessary, ensuring conformity with national policy and the Local Plan.

Step 6 – Pre-Submission Consultation (Regulation 14)

Publish the draft Neighbourhood Plan for formal consultation (minimum six weeks), inviting representations from the community, statutory consultees and other stakeholders.

Step 7 – Submission to the Local Planning Authority (Regulation 15)

Submit the revised Plan, Consultation Statement and Basic Conditions Statement to Mid Suffolk District Council.

Step 8 – Independent Examination (Regulation 17)

An independent examiner considers whether the Plan meets the Basic Conditions and makes recommendations, which may include modifications.

Step 9 – Referendum Decision and Preparation

Mid Suffolk District Council considers the examiner's report, agrees the final version of the Plan, and decides whether it should proceed to referendum.

Step 10 – Referendum (If necessary as a Material Update)

LPA organises a local referendum. If more than 50% of those voting support the Plan, it can proceed to be "made" (adopted) as part of the statutory Development Plan.
